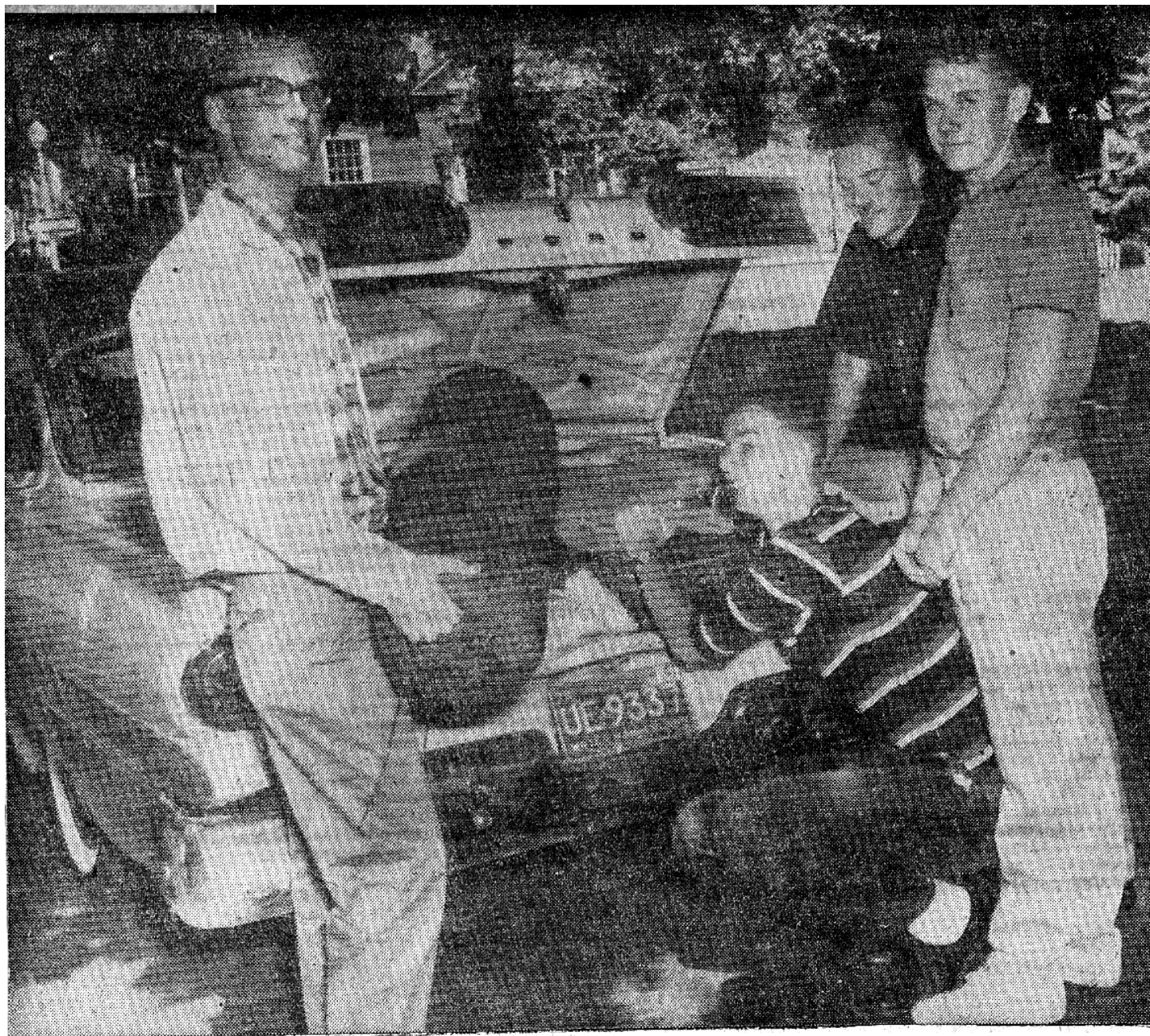

Bands which qualified in the district festival in March will participate in the state event sponsored by the Michigan State Band and Orchestra Association.

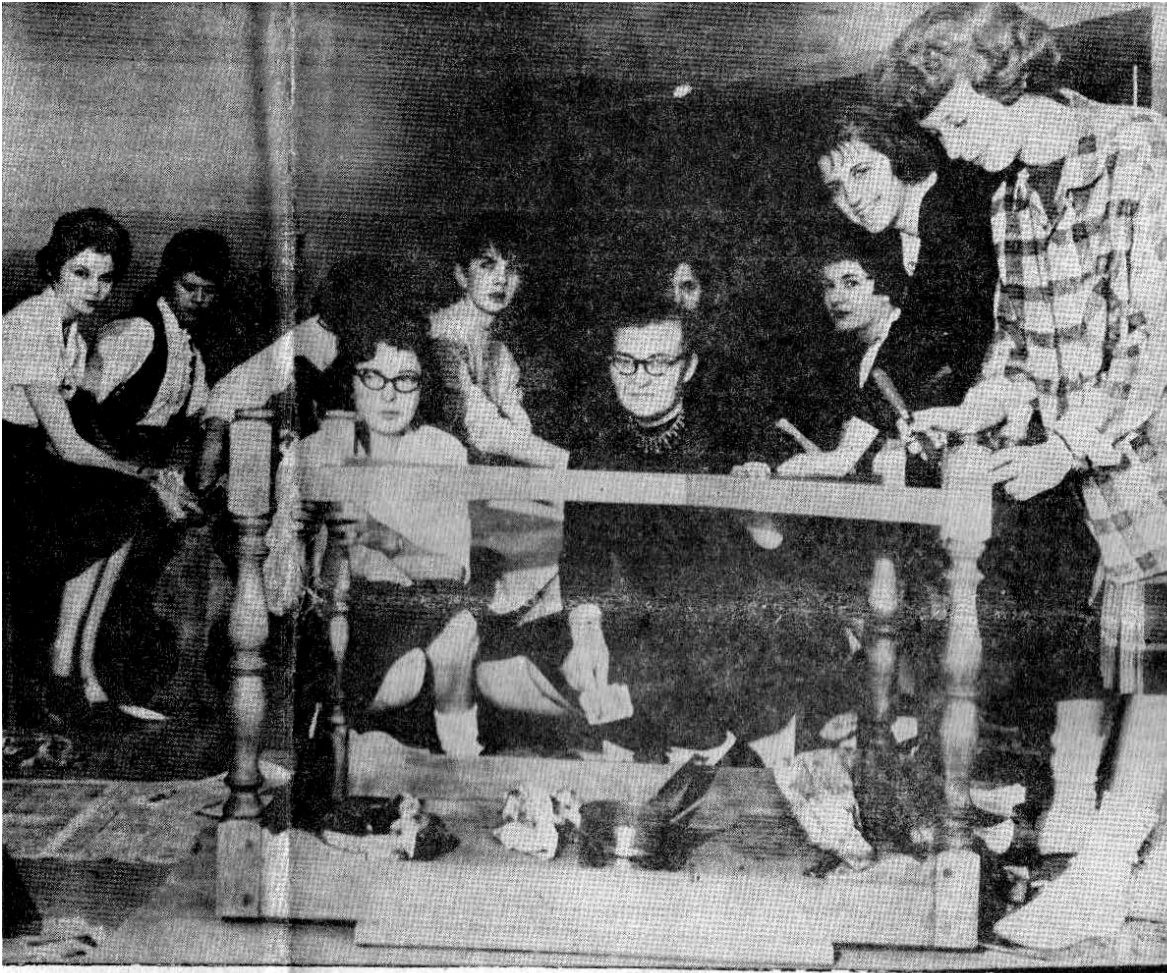

Furniture Refinishing Class Provides Valuable Know-How For H. S. Girls

Today it's fun. And learning, too. But the day may come for many of the 39 Hillsdale junior class students when their training in furni-

ture refinishing will mean a great deal to them.

Two classes in furniture refinishing are conducted by Mrs. Elizabeth Russell, home economics instructor, this year. This has been a phase of home economics train-

ing for about four years.

"The girls bring the pieces of furniture they refinish from home. A few times, none have been available and we have asked townspeople to help up out and they did."

It's hard work but the girls seem to enjoy it and the work is easier when they are doing it together.

Some time ago, they salvaged a secretary, cut the top off, and made a good-looking desk of the bottom. They make their own selections of stains to fit in with the furniture with which their article will be surrounded. Most of the finishing is in dull satin.

Many young people start married life on a small scale. They even raid the attics of their parents' home for furniture to be used until their budgets permit better. A knowledge of refinishing is a real boon to one of these brides.

In later years, when she has spare time, it may prove valuable as a hobby. Some women make a business of renovating furniture. The knowledge may also be valuable when an accident mars good furniture, too.

Its an art, that, when once learned, cannot be lost.

John Savarino Defeats Dale Brott For

Jane Donnelly New Golf Queen

Last season's Hillsdale Country Club golf champion, Joe Savarino, went off to Ann Arbor this year and captured fourth place in the city tournament there.

But his younger brother, John, carried on the family tradition at the Hillsdale course Labor Day afternoon. He took home the club's top trophy—the men's title in the championship flight—with a 3 and 2 victory over Dale Brott, winner twice during the 1930s.

Davis Retired, But He's Far From Idle

As one of the army of 3,000 students who graduated from Hillsdale High School under the leadership of Bernard L. Davis, we wondered what he is doing now that he has retired.

"At present I'm relaxing and I'm getting real good at it," said Mr. Davis. "I'm sort of retired, but not dead enough to be buried!"

Mr. Davis was, to the student, the occupant of the inner sanctum. We would steal glimpses of him through the office glass, and on occasion were confronted by his tall, long-legged frame coming upon us in the hall. After such encounters we would scamp off to class without any dawdling!

Mr. and Mrs. Davis live at 33 West Hallett St. in a comfortable, one-story white house with red shutters. Keeping the house in good repair, and gardening, especially flower gardening, are two of Mr. Davis' hobbies. He says he "likes to see stuff grow, although I don't attempt to make a garden like my neighbor, Ralph Owen."

Another hobby is taking colored pictures in the frequent trips Mr. and Mrs. Davis take. They have traveled most to Northern Michigan. "Yes, I wear out that bridge up there. We like to see the countryside. Prefer hotels to motels—not quite so lonesome, there's more people around."

Born in Vermont, Mr. Davis' childhood ambition was to be a teacher. He remembers his teachers' encouragement as he was studying, the kind of help he has given his students to help them attain their ambitions. The most thrilling thing that happen-

ed to him as a young man was getting his first teaching job.

One of his early teaching jobs was in Romeo, Mich. He was hired without knowing that there was a juvenile gang in full operation that had roughed up a male teacher. Soon recognizing the situation, and determining the leader, Mr. Davis told the lad that "You were doing a good job making a monkey out of yourself during class. Do it again. I'll help you!" The parents fully backed the action and there was no more trouble from that quarter. Mr. Davis states emphatically that teachers must have the full cooperation of the parents if problems such as these are to be licked.

"By the way," added Mr. Davis, "I went back to visit

in Romeo in 1936. I looked like an old Rip Van Winkle! The only person I could find with whom I had worked was the old secretary, and she was in a wheel chair!"

What does Mr. Davis think about the schools now?

"I think schools have improved right along. We still must have the basic subjects. I think the change has come in added subjects such as gym, music, home economics, guidance. Spanish in the grade schools. Whether we believe in them or not, there is a place for them.

"People are asking more of the schools. The way of life is changing. Parents don't pay enough attention to their children. That's why we have such things as driver training which takes up time during the school day. It doesn't belong in the school day, but the schools take on the responsibility.

"One of my major concerns now is—are we doing enough about the moral and spiritual training of our youngsters. In my travels around the state I have seen more and more parochial schools being built. Their major emphasis is, of course, religious training. It seems that parents must be demanding moral training or there wouldn't be so many of these church-affiliated schools started."

Mr. Davis feels that we are living in the most wonderful period in history. Of all scientific advancements that will be made in the future, he is looking forward most to the great strides in medicine. Of this he believes that control of disease will be the most important.

"No, I'm not in favor of federal aid to education. In my experience with vocational agriculture and veterans training, I feel that the government will not provide money without control," states Mr. Davis.

For the future, Mr. Davis sees the formation of community colleges. Hillsdale has the ideal set-up for such a school. Mr. Davis explains that college students and faculty could take over the high school building at the end of the scholastic day, and give students the equivalent of a two-year college education. "There are many qualified teachers right here in the county who could take over such a project," Mr. Davis adds, "and think what a saving it would be to the student and his parents. This type of higher education program would be eligible for state aid."

Asked for some words of wisdom for today's students, Mr. Davis says, "There's nothing wrong with education that a little work won't cure. Our youngsters must study more."

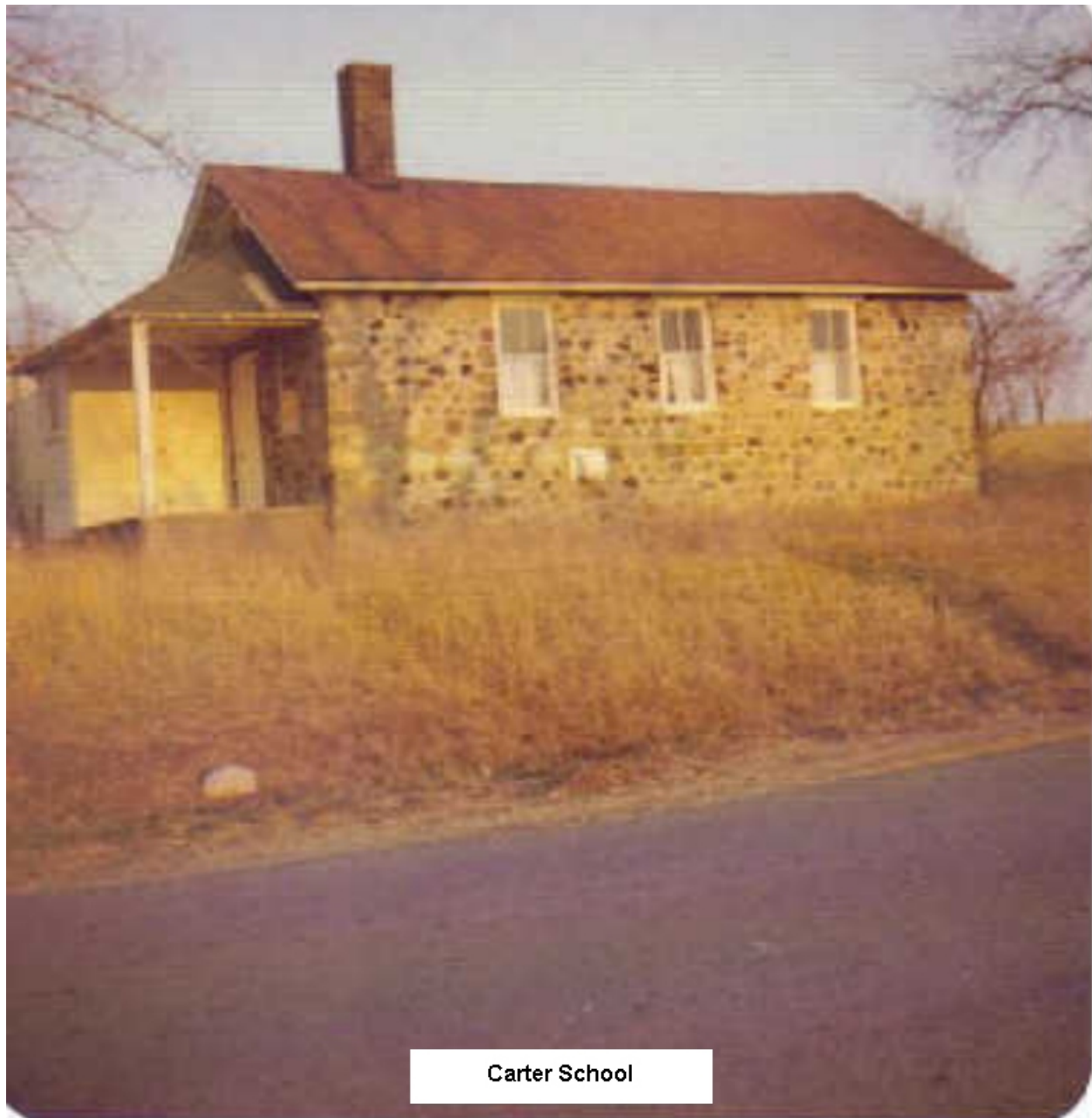
For parents of students, "Insist on good school work. If it isn't good, find out why. Remember that sympathetic understanding goes a long, long way toward helping the backward student. And cooperate with the teachers—back them up in their decisions as to what is right for your child."

For senior citizens, "A little work is good for them too. Keep busy."

All these comments explain why the following is Mr. Davis' favorite quote: "An inch of man is worth a mile of pedigree."

Crowd Pays Honor To Veteran Director

An erect, stately man who looked 10 years younger than his 70 odd years rose from his seat in the auditorium. He walked to the podium, lifted a baton and with experienced strokes led 70 musicians in a stirring march number.

When it was finished he bowed his handsome, iron gray thatched head to the audience and then to the band. He calmly walked off the platform amid the thunderous applause from the spectators who filled the balcony and were liberally sprinkled through the main floor.

The ovation was a warm, heartfelt tribute to William E. Lint, who did so much as a director to stimulate a love of music among Hillsdale residents who are now middle aged or past and who has contributed two sons, Robert and Jack, to the musical tradition of the community.

The march was "Salute to Hillsdale," a number he composed 21 years ago when the Hillsdale High School band won the first of its many state honors. The band, of course, was this year's prize winning Hillsdale organization and the occasion as the school's annual spring band and orchestra concert.

Robert M. Lint, the director turned the podium over to his father for the march number and listened from the wings.

For the next number, selections from the musical Oklahoma, he relinquished the center of the stage to his brother, Jack, assistant director.

Altogether it was a satisfying evening.

The Hillsdale High orchestra featured Judy Kempton in Telemann's Concerto for Viola and Orchestra, a number handled with a fine sense of feeling and assurance by the soloist.

Ralph Foulke, concertmaster, gained special recognition for his featured work in the intriguing "Danse Macabre" by Saint-Saens. The orchestra also performed an overture by Glinka and a highly romantic love duet by Hanson. It closed with an excellent rendition of selections from Gershwin's Porgy and Bess.

The band opened with a brisk march by Cavas and followed with a moody Coronation Scene by

the Russian composer, Moussorgsky.

March of the Little Fauns by Pierre provided a pleasant change of the pace before the band played a highly diverting suite of Old American Dances.

Osterling's spirited Busman's Holiday closed the program.

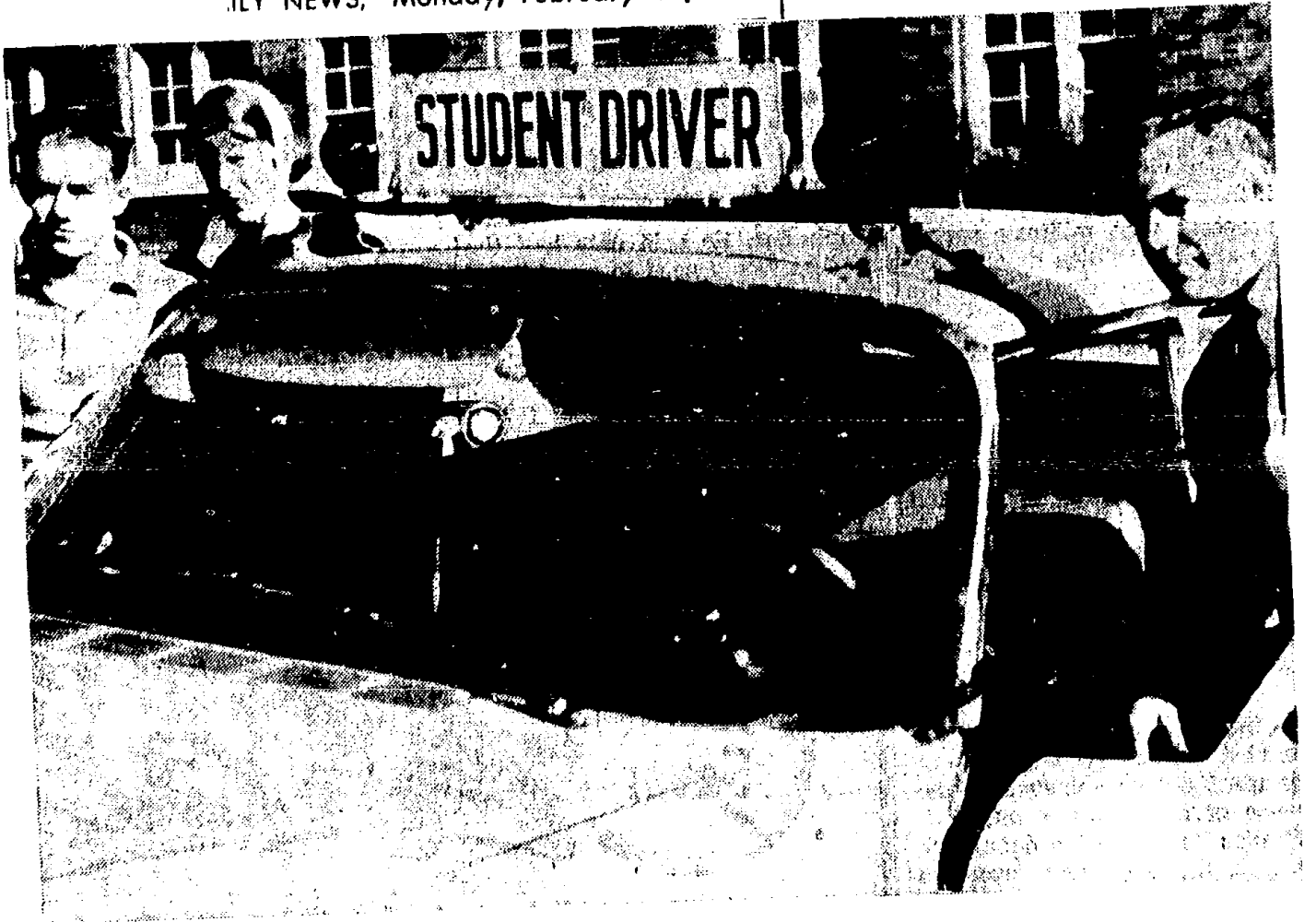
